## LALBRECHT FAMILY HISTORY

Charles Frederic Lambrecht was born in Germany on March 28, 1796. He was a shoemaker in Vlotho, Germany. He married Johanna Sophia Schlschmier. She was born on December 26, 1800. They had eight children including Carl, Justine, Antone, Johanna, Charles, Rieke, Amalie, and Henry. The oldest and youngest sons of Charles Lambrecht came to America and settled in Freeport, Illinois and later in Webster County, Nebraska.

Carl Frederic Lambrecht, the oldest son, was born on December 29, 1833, at Dortmund, Germany. The youngest son, Henry John Lambrecht, was born on January 2, 1842, at Providence, West Falen, Germany. The other two brothers and four sisters never came to the United States.

The making of cigars was a family industry in Germany and remained their trade when they migrated to the United States.

Another family, the Pruessners, were friends of the Lambrecht family in Germany. As years went by, one by one of each family came to America and settled with family or friends at Freeport, Illinois.

Memories of Charlotte Pruessner, age 15, and Louise Pruessner, age 9, coming across the sea include coming on a sail ship, thus making the crossing last for 9 weeks, and as a result, their food and water supply ran low and had to be rationed to finish the voyage.

At Freeport, the two families joined again, when Fred (Carl) Lambrecht and Charlotte Pruessner were married in 1868.

Another sister, Fredarika Pruessner, married Henry Bretthauer who was born in Germany and had come with his family to Freeport.

Again, the Lambrecht and Pruessner families attended a wedding which joined Louise Pruessner and Henry Lambrecht in marriage, September 22, 1877. Louise had been born in West Falen, Germany, November 21, 1858. After coming to Freeport she was confirmed in March, 1872. Henry was born in West Falen, Germany January 2, 1842 and had come to Freeport in 1871.

Julius Pruessner, a brother of Louise, Charlotte and Fredarika, was married in Freeport to Hannah Bretthauer.

In 1880 the west beckoned and a promise of new land lured these families to Webster County, Nebraska. They came by train from Freeport in February. Hastings was the railroad terminal to which they came. A board shelter was hastily put up in Hastings to provide a home for the women and children while the men came on to Catherton precinct, Webster County, to make a dugout for each family.

That spring, the families came to their new homes by wagon and oxen which had to be bought from earlier settlers.

The first year, according to Homestead Law, they had to break 40 acres of their new land. The second year another 40 acres was required to be broken.

Julius and Hannah Pruessner lived here only about 2 years and returned to Freeport. There two children were born, Emma and Tillie. There too, Julius died and later Hannah came to Milford and married Bernhard Moorberg who had three children, Sarah, Ed and Fred. Children of this marriage were Paul, Jessie, Clara, Lewis and Ella.

At last, the new homes they sought and a new occupation were theirs. These families settled close to one another and this kinship and neighborliness have remained strong traits down through the years, resulting in a feeling of genuine concern for each other among all members of the family.



## MEMORIES

I came to Nebraska in 1878 with my parents when I was 6 years old. We were four children. We came with Mr. and Mrs. Wolf and their four children and Uncle Julius and Aunt Hannah from Freeport, Illinois.

When we got to Hastings, the men built a shack just big enough so we could all get in. The furniture was stacked up behind Uncle Julius' Newfoundland dog, Rover, who was tied to a table leg to keep prowlers away. One night he dragged the table all over the prairie till the table leg pulled off.

The men hired a team and wagon and went to Webster County, about 40 miles away, where they first made a dugout for the Wolf family, which took 3 weeks. Then a wagon came and got the Wolf family. With them gone, the rest of us could turn around in the shack. Three weeks later, a neighbor came after us. The wagon was loaded with furniture. Mother and the baby sat on the stove, Aunt Hannah, I and my sisters didn't have such a nice seat.

The homesteads were all gone when father and Mr. Wolf decided to go west, but they bought railroad land. Father's land cost \$3.50 per acre, with 10 years to pay for it. He broke 80 acres the first 2 years. Father bought a yoke of oxen (named Buck and Bright), a cow, a razorback sow and some chickens.

We lived in the dugout 5 or 6 years. It was part dugout 4 feet in the bank, part sod and had a sod front plastered with native clay which was very good and cheap. Mother hung bed sheets on the wall to make it look nice and to keep the dirt from sifting. Sod walls were very nice for mice. When we saw them wiggle behind the sheet, we could swat and kill them. Once when the sheet wiggled and we hit, it was a snake.

There was a large prairie dog town a half mile from us. I'd go there with my dog and kill rattlesnakes. I was bitten by a rattlesnake when I was 12 years old. A snake generally gives a warning before he strikes, but this one didn't. It couldn't. I was planting watermelons on sod. The snake was under the sod, which I was chopping with a hoe. He stuck his head out to see what was going on, and seeing my bare foot, struck me. Then he pulled his head back under the sod.

I should have chopped him out, but didn't. It was near sundown when I got home and told Mother. At first she thought I was joking and didn't believe that a rattlesnake killer like me could get bitten. When I told her how the snake got me, they killed a young chicken and tied the warm flesh on my foot. This was supposed to draw the poison out.

Whisky was supposed to be a sure cure. We were not whisky drinkers, but kept some on hand in case of sickness. But the bottle was empty, so my older sister ran 1½ miles to Uncle Henry's. Their bottle had about 2 spoonfuls in it; but I guess that was enough for I didn't die.

Father planted 40 acres of corn on sod the first year with a hand planter. That fall father and Uncle Julius got wood from south of the Republican river - 9 miles away. They would ford the river with 2 yoke of oxen on a load, then ride the oxen across and bring the other load.



Later father built the sod house. He was very careful, and every sod had to fit. The walls had to be straight and smooth. The side walls were 2½ feet thick and end wall 3 feet. The roof was boards and tar paper. Then a layer of sod with clay pounded into the cracks. After the walls had settled they were plastered with natural clay.

One of the early settlers who came in a covered wagon brought some hens. Not having any place to keep them, he took them into the dugout where they roosted on the foot of the bed. They froze to death one night in a blizzard.

We had some very hard times the first years, but we never went hungry. We raised everything we had to eat. Coffee was 15¢ a pound, but we used barley, sweet corn and home-grown peas. I don't know which tasted the best, but the peas were sure hard to grind.

Mother had a spinning wheel. She would get a fleece of wool from George Cather-spin the yarn and knit stockings and mittens for all the family.

The best move father ever made was when he came to Nebraska. The sod house is gone now, only the memory is here.

If a small white porcelain bowl, still in the possession of Lydia Lambrecht, could talk, it would tell us many tales of long ago. It belonged to Charlotte, her mother, while she still lived in Germany. It was used as a butter jar in which Charlotte carried her portion of butter for her meals when she worked for a family close by.

Willa Cather was a pioneer too, and a dear friend of Charlotte Pruessner Lambrecht. For many years after Willa went to New York to live, she remembered Charlotte on her birthday and at Christmas.

Lydia Lambrecht

Many were the hardships endured to carve a new home out of the prairies but one of the hardest that Henry John Lambrecht, Sr. experienced was the loss of the eyesight in his right eye. He was cutting strips of leather from one large piece when the knife slipped and struck him in the eye. He went to Kansas to the closest eye specialist but to no avail.

Out of necessity, Christmas gifts had to be practical. One Christmas is recalled when each child was given a new dinner plate, thus a gift for the child and for Mother a new set of dishes. In later years these plates went to the homes of the children as they made new homes for themselves.

Elsie Lambrecht Skjelver

I remember the Christmas when my folks decorated branches from trees instead of Christmas trees. Only one boughten gift and a home-made gift was all the children would receive. Sheets were used to divide the rooms in the sod house so naturally the children could see and hear what was going on getting ready for Christmas.

hearing about Fred Lambrecht Sr. and Henry Lambrecht Sr. singing for the Keiser of Germany in a men's choir.

the happy winter evenings when the Bretthauer's walked over bringing their violin and mouth harp. The organ and accordian were played too. Quite often we played a card game called Flinch.

the cured hams, shoulders, and bacon covered with red pepper, Borax, and vinegar and hanging from huge spikes driven into beams that made up the roof of the cellar.

the sliced apples and peaches on the porch roof to dry for dried fruit.

the joy of building the new frame house.

Herbert sitting on a nail keg getting his long curls cut off by one of the carpenters when the new house was being built.

I REMEMBER - - - -

a long narrow board used as a form or mold to make cigars that was brought from Germany and made two dozen cigars at one time.

the stacks of pancakes mother used to serve with sausage gravy, the big stone crocks with home-made stuffed link sausages, covered with lard to keep it, the lard press and big sausage grinder.

Ted Lambrecht

a small board lean-to built on the south side of the sod house over the door that we called the cabinet (ku-ban-et).

Walt Lambrecht

I can remember a few times when we had quite heavy rains during the night and the middle room which was the bedroom, leaked so badly that mother put all the smaller children in one bed and opened up the big black parasol to keep us dry. As I said before, the middle room was the bedroom. In the middle of the board floor was a small trap door which opened into the cellar under the house. Mother had baked many large loaves of lovely bread that afternoon and placed it on a large square bread board on two chairs beside this trap door. Mother had left the door open this particular night. Hearing strange noises in the night Mother lighted her little coal oil lamp and she said you should have seen the rats jump off of that bread and disappear into the cellar. I don't remember how Mother ended that story.



Memories, cont'd.

When my brother Fred was a young boy he spent 25¢ for a mouth harp. He prized this lovely musical instrument very highly. I was the little sister and I dearly loved his music and wished that I might learn to play just like brother Fred. When I would ask him if I could play his harp he said "Oh you would blow in it with your mouth full of bread crumbs and that would ruin my harp". So Fred hid it in the hay mow in the south window and you had to climb up a steep ladder to get to that window. It was up that ladder I had to climb and get the harp, then I would sit on the hay till I picked out a few simple tunes, then climb back up the ladder, put the harp in its hidden place. Then one evening when Fred was playing his harp I said to him "just once let me play it" and when I played it he said "I didn't know you could play it. And my harp still plays all keys so I bet you never played it with bread crumbs in your mouth". That is how I learned to play the mouth harp.
